As both a founding member of the Hospice of Michigan Foundation Board and a past chair of the not-for-profit's Board of Trustees, Larry Bos has been a passionate advocate for Hospice of Michigan for nearly three decades. Together with his wife Dolores, they have been among Hospice of Michigan's most loyal and generous donors.

Through the years, Dolores and Larry's legacy of generosity has manifested itself in many ways as they each took great joy in serving others. Complementing Larry's Board service, Dolores served on our fundraising committee and shared her artistic skills to design Hospice of Michigan's iconic *Crystal Rose*, symbolic of the quality of care Hospice of Michigan provides.

Sadly, in 2018, death came suddenly and unexpectedly to Dolores. Larry was, and continues to be, heartbroken. "I have been blessed with an extraordinary life, made even richer and more fulfilling by a long, happy marriage to the most giving person in the world, my beloved wife Dolores," Larry recently said.

In life, Dolores' commitment to help others through life's challenges inspired Larry to donate \$1 million to establish the **Dolores Bos Family Caregiver Support Fund**.



The **Dolores Bos Family Caregiver Support Fund** will provide the support and resources family caregivers need to care for their loved ones, bringing honor and dignity to each day they have together. The support Hospice of Michigan, and our partner Arbor Hospice, provides patients and their families not only helps them

navigate this most sacred stage of life, but also makes such a difference in how families cope throughout the end-of-life journey. A huge component of this *Caregiver Support Fund* will fund:

• Patients' quality-of-life needs such as fans, a cell phone, meals, small electric bills – those items often taken for granted, but for some are necessities as families are struggling with end-of-life issues.

- Grief support counseling for family members before and after the death of their loved one.
- A 24/7 caregiver support line for day and nighttime calls to answer questions and dispatch a nurse to a patient's home during a crisis if needed.
- Social work support for couples and family members to help with emotional needs throughout their care and assist with healthy living after the death of a loved one.

At a special luncheon held in Grand Rapids in July, Larry explained his motivation to establish this fund, stating "I believe that becoming a family caregiver, especially at the end of life, is the ultimate expression of love and selflessness. These often overlooked heroes make it possible for their loved one to remain in the comfort and familiarity of their homes, while taking on the majority of their daily care themselves, under the guidance of the hospice care team."

A Life of Giving Back

Growing up on the family's non-working dairy farm is where the Karner siblings learned life lessons about giving back to their community. Joseph "Al" and Mary Karner instilled in their children the importance of taking care of each other and opening their home – and their hearts – to those in need.

Al served in the U.S. Army during World War II and when he returned from duty in 1947, he bought his first of 21 Wilson Dairy Milk Routes – the largest retail milk distributor in the state of Michigan. The following year, he married Mary, and over the years, they welcomed six children.

In 1957, the Karner's bought a farm in West Bloomfield and it quickly became a home where everyone was welcome. Sunday afternoons were filled with gatherings of friends and family enjoying home-cooked meals and creating lifetime memories. Al's contagious and loud laughter could be heard throughout the property, and Mary's home cooking assured that no one left hungry.

Always active in the community, Al was regularly involved in fundraising for local causes. He coached Little League Baseball, owned **The Copper Mug Bar** in Walled Lake, established the **Walled Lake Industrial Softball League**, and built **The Copper Mug Batting Cages**, now managed by his son, Mike. Al loved people and always stepped in to help when someone was in need. His actions taught his children life-long lessons of giving back.

"The reason I do all the fundraisers is because the community has been good to me, and you always like to give something back. We will continue to help people as we go on and as the need comes along. - Al Karner

When Al sold the family farm after Mary's passing in 1994 he wanted the proceeds of the sale to make a positive impact in the community, establishing *The Al and Mary Karner*

Charitable Trust. Al had the foresight to create this trust allowing his surviving children to determine what nonprofit organizations they wished to fund 10 years following his death. The children are now thoughtfully allocating disbursements from the trust to support worthy causes with their parents' interests in mind.

Because Al was cared for by hospice during his final days, the Karner children presented a check of \$30,500 to Hospice of Michigan. Al's daughter, Gail, is also a registered nurse for Hospice of Michigan.

Teen Brothers Volunteer to Visit People Facing their Last Days

Recent high school graduate, Marshall Smith, may seem like a typical 18 year old, participating in school activities and spending time with friends and family. While one of the highlights of his senior year was playing Lumiere in Cadillac High School's spring production of Disney's Beauty and the Beast, Marshall and his 15-year-old brother Gavin also volunteer for Hospice of Michigan, serving as patient companions. "Doing this helps you cope with death," Marshall said. "Instead of avoiding it, I'm facing it."

The Smith brothers follow the example of their mom, Brook Pollington—Smith, who encouraged them to join in the volunteer work that inspires her. "Last year I read about how there are hospice patients who would sometimes go a couple of days without seeing anyone, and how Hospice of Michigan needed people to fill those

spaces," said Smith. She called to volunteer that very day, and since then she has provided companionship, bedside vigils and caregiver relief to those facing their last days.

When Marshall's mom brought up volunteering at Hospice of Michigan, he admitted that he really didn't know what hospice was. "I was intrigued. It's sad that patients are dying and there (are times) when no one is with them. I decided to try it out."

Gavin also agreed "to test the waters." Receiving training and supervision on their first few visits, they quickly discovered that the hospice patients really enjoy listening to them talk about school and their daily activities. "You see them as an equal person and talk to them like a friend," Gavin said.

"I am so proud of these young men," said Kathy Lietaert, Hospice

of Michigan's Volunteer Service Manager for northern Michigan. "Dying is a part of life. They are so wise because the rest of society doesn't even face death that way. It's great they spend time with the gift of their youth and the gift of what they have learned. It's very inspiring to the team, patients and families."

Grief Support Delivered in Unique Ways

Hospice care is as much about the patient and their end-of-life journey as it is about the circle of family and friends who must deal with their loss. Hospice of Michigan's Master's-level grief support professionals have the expertise and skills to work with bereaved to understand their pain and suggest unique ways to help manage their feelings. In addition to traditional grief support groups offered throughout Michigan's Lower Peninsula, grief support managers are able to facilitate meaningful opportunities to family members grieving the loss of a loved one.

An Heirloom in the Making

When a young couple received devastating news – the husband was diagnosed with Stage 4 cancer and expected to have just a few months to live – their world was turned upside down. With four young children, ages 5, 7, 9 and 13, Will Gasper, Grief Support Services Manager in Cadillac, knew he could help the family manage their anticipatory grief.

Will met with the family and brought a special craft that the whole family could do together – making clay hearts from Sculpey oven–bake clay. During the project, the kids were told of their father's health, what was happening, and encouraged them to ask questions and express their feelings.

Before baking and decorating the hearts, the father's thumbprints were pressed in the center of the heart along with each of the children's – symbolic that he would always be with them in their hearts.

Knowing that the days and months ahead will be difficult, Will explained to the children that they will always have their father's one-of-a-kind

thumbprint to hold on to and that it would help them remember the special memories they created as a family.

The sacred moments that the family spent together to create this personalized family heirloom helped open up a difficult discussion with the children. It also left them with a very special memento honoring their father that they will be able to treasure forever.

A Memory Bear Delivered

Mary Eileen signed on to Hospice of Michigan services in the fall of 2018, and remained in her home with the care and support of hospice staff and family members, including granddaughter, Kimberly. During Mary Eileen's illness, Kimberly, and husband Justin, learned that they were expecting their first child – a boy! Unfortunately, Mary Eileen passed away before welcoming her 9th greatgrandchild into the world.

In anticipation of the baby shower, daughters, Maureen and Jacqueline, decided to buy a stroller for Maureen's daughter, Kimberly. They also searched for a way to include the memory of Mary Eileen in the gift. Thanks to Hospice of Michigan's volunteer Memory Bear sewers, her daughters asked to have a Memory Bear made from Mary Eileen's favorite blue robe.

Knowing that the bear was a gift for an expectant mother, Mary Eileen's Memory
Bear was crafted with care, making sure it was babyproof with no buttons, and eyes that were embroidered. This personalized bear was securely fastened to the stroller and presented at Kimberly's baby shower.

Kimberly and Justin welcomed baby boy Ryan to their family in June 2019. While Ryan never met his greatgrandmother, he has a very special keepsake from her.

A Culture of Giving Back

Betz Industries, a gray iron and ductile iron foundry in Grand Rapids, has a rich history of supporting Hospice of Michigan. What started as an opportunity for Betz Industries' leaders to instill a culture of giving back with their employees, has evolved into a long-lasting partnership that continues to grow – touching many lives in the process.

For several years, Betz Industries selected a different local not-for-profit organization each year to benefit from their annual employee fundraising effort. Selecting a new beneficiary every year, they invited Hospice of Michigan to be the recipient of this annual effort more than 20 years ago.

Fortuitously, Hospice of Michigan's Walk and Remember fundraiser provided a wonderful experience to engage the staff in a meaningful way. In that first year, employees assembled a team of staff and family members – representing approximately 25% of their employees – to participate in the Walk and Remember fundraiser. During the event, it came to light that many of the participating walkers had already experienced the benefits of hospice care.

As more employees experienced the care provided to their family members through Hospice of Michigan, the partnership blossomed. With this increased interest in and use of Hospice of Michigan amongst employees, Betz Industries shifted their employee giving philosophy, naming Hospice of Michigan its annual not-for-profit partner.

Today, the company is a fully engaged partner, matching employee donations dollar-for-dollar, sponsoring Hospice of Michigan fundraising events, and offering a payroll deduction program with the flexibility for employees to make a one-time annual donation, or a recurring gift throughout the year. Currently, 95% of all Betz employees donate to Hospice of Michigan.

Since introducing their culture of giving back 23 years ago, this philanthropic company and its employees have raised \$1.2 million in support of Hospice of Michigan programs and services.

As a special thank you to Betz Industries and their employees, Hospice of Michigan staff hosts an annual celebration lunch featuring BBQ from Saladino Smoke, a local favorite. At this year's luncheon in May, Betz Industries proudly presented a check for nearly \$50,000, representing annual employee contributions.
